Notes on selections from Mendelssohn's music for A Midsummer Night's Dream The song Ye Spotted Snakes occurs in Act II when the Fairy Queen Titania calls her elves and bids "Sing me now asleep; then to your offices and let me rest". While she sleeps, Oberon touches her eyelids with the magic flower which causes her to fall in love with the first creature she sees — Bottom the weaver, transformed into a donkey, as it turns out — when she awakes.

The Nocturne accompanies the sleep of the mortal lovers between Acts III and IV, after which the various confusions of the night are resolved "...and all shall be well".

In the Finale the fairies sing to bless Theseus's palace and its occupants with good fortune. Four magic chords end the dream.


